I. Reconciliation and Forgiveness in Theology

- Reconciliation then means the restoring of our relationship with God through Jesus Christ.
- Reconciliation in Christ makes communion with God possible again in that Christ atones for the guilt that comprises the barrier between God and humankind. God thus makes a new beginning with the world "in Christ."
- In reconciling the world with himself God has left "finger prints" or traces of this in his creation and leaves it to us to discover these.







II. Political Reconciliation in South Africa and Germany

- Option 1: The criminal prosecution of serious violations of human rights.
- Option 2: The opposite option: doing nothing, either by granting a general amnesty or by simply "letting matters rest".
- Option 3: The exposure of past injustices, e.g. by means of so-called truth commissions.
- Option 4: Compensation for victims, e.g. the restoration of land, material reparation, and legal and moral rehabilitation.
- Option 5: Sanctions that go beyond the criminal law, e.g.
 purging the civil service, including the police and the military,
 of those guilty of collaborating with the crimes of the
 previous regime.
