

ESCHATOLOGICAL CLEANSING? RESURRECTION IN THE NEW TESTAMENT Candida Moss

The resurrection of the body is proclaimed as part of the creed and in the pages of the New Testament, yet the question of what that resurrection looks like is under examined. This paper will explore how interpretations of biblical texts about the resurrection and historically derived constructions of the perfect resurrected body affect vulnerable members of the community, in particular people with disabilities.

Candida Moss is Edward Cadbury Professor of Theology at the University of Birmingham. She specialises in the study of the New Testament and martyrdom in early Christianity. A graduate of Oxford and

Yale, she was previously Professor at the University of Notre Dame, USA. An award-winning author, her books include The Myth of Persecution: How Early Christians Invented a Story of Martyrdom (2013), Reconceiving Infertility: Biblical Perspectives on Procreation and Childlessness (2015). She is the papal news commentator for CBS news and has contributed to LA Times, New York Times, Washington Post, and many more.
